Over the course of the next few months, this group of more than twenty individuals would become a team. This team would travel 8,000 miles to serve in the Borana region in southern Ethiopia. Some would serve in the cities of Mega and Yavello, while others would go out into the surrounding villages. Everyone would share God's love in their own unique way.

In the months leading up to the trip the group met together twice a month to pray, prepare and bond. Unity among team members was a priority. It was amazing to see God knit all twenty-two individuals together as one body. Each person in the group was challenged to think about

how they wanted to be perceived as a team. Over the course of a few weeks, Philippians 2:1-4 was chosen as the team verses. During the weeks leading up to the trip and also during the trip, the team would read through these verses countless times.

As their departure drew near, God continued to knit the team together. To say the team was diverse would be an understatement. This was not only the largest team I had led to Ethiopia, but it was by far the most diverse. Team members ranged from a young middle school student whose laughter would lift our spirits, to a business owner in his sixties who never failed to remind each one of us how much we were loved. Nearly half of

Sisay Getachew Kala Huka Evangelism is at the heart of everything that Hand of Hope is involved with. We have been blessed to partner with churches throughout southern Ethiopia who share our burden for taking the Gospel to remote villag-HOH has 6 partner churches located in Hawassa, Yavello, Teltelle, Mega, Hidilola and Moyale. Each partner church is given a budget based on funds available to HOH. The budget is to be used solely for evangelism in remote villages. HOH encourages the partner church to supplement funds provided through HOH in order to have increased ownership in the work taking place. Evangelists are hired

by the local church and held accountable to church leaders. The church is responsible for gathering reports and following up on work that the evangelists are involved with. Once the church has gathered the reports, they must submit them to HOH. If the church fails to provide reports to HOH according to the Partnership Agreement, HOH will withhold funding until the requirements are met.

One of the challenges that many of the evangelists are facing is a lack of teaching materials. There is no Bible teaching material available in the Oromo language. This presents a problem to the

current generation who only understand Oromo. HOH has been able to provide each of the evangelists with some simple teaching materials that were written and compiled by volunteers in the United States and translated into the Oromo language by a volunteer in Canada. HOH would like to continue to

find ways to provide even more material to the evangelists in order to assist them in reaching more souls with the message of the Gospel.

Another challenge that many of the HOH evangelists face is an adequate place of wor-As congregations in ship. remote villages grow, believers outgrow homes where they are meeting and need a building large enough to accommodate all of them. Members of these congregations do not have sufficient funds to build a church, so these small congregations rely heavily on outside support to provide necessary backing.

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Passing the Torch

When I started thinking about what to share about the 2014 mission trip, a lot came to mind. It is hard to even decide on which topic to pick and write about. It is difficult to explain to others what transpired on the trip this year unless whoever is reading this was there. All the faces of people we met and worked with, but left behind in Ethiopia, come to mind. Traveling with my daughters to the villages of Gaayo and Saarite to do God's work made me so proud of them. When I was out in the villages and in the town of Mega, I would often step back and look

at this group of Americans interacting with the local children. I wondered if the children even knew how lucky they were to have someone travel 8000 miles just because they love them. That is my human mind thinking. What would God say? I get goose bumps thinking about it. I am sure God would say, "Sons and daughters, you served well, respected well and loved well. It is for this reason I created you and called you my own."

My father, Tuffa Deresu Badane, passed away one week before we arrived in Ethiopia. I wish he could have waited another week so that he could have met the new team members, whom he had not yet met, that I brought from America: but it was all God's timing and I will accept that. Tuffa was one of the first evangelists in the Borana area. He served for many years travelling from village to village in southern Ethiopia to preach the Gospel. He reached many, and our team was able to see the fruit of his work. Many people came to know Christ through him. He is one of the reasons that I am a believer today. I remember us having a weekly Bible study in our home when I was growing up. Tuffa was a strict father when it came to attending church. There was no way any of my siblings, or myself, were allowed to miss church unless he was out of town.

I have always considered myself to be the fruit of missionaries. Without missionaries, I would most likely not be a believer today. My father was the only believer from his side of our family. I can see why some of his family had nothing to do with him since he moved away to preach the Gospel. European missionaries came to my father's village in the Showa region of Ethiopia, northwest of



the capital city of Addis Ababa. It was through the work of these missionaries that my father came to know Christ as his personal savior and ultimately to travel with them to southern Ethiopia to spread the Gospel among the Borana people. Tuffa continued to work with Scandinavian missionaries, and our entire family was greatly influenced by these missionaries as we grew up. Missionaries built a school behind our house, and all of us children were able to attend school from an early age because of these missionaries. I am truly the fruit of missionaries. There are thousands like me out there.

Before my father passed away, he knew our mission team was on the way to do God's work. I am confident that he died happy, knowing that the torch he passed on will continue burning and touch others with the wonderful news of the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

Love Always Gets the Last Word

If I could choose three words to sum up my trip to Ethiopia, one of them would definitely be humility. Our team collectively felt that Philippians 2 was our passage. It says:

"Do nothing from selfish ambition or conceit, but in humility count others more significant than yourselves...Have this mind among yourselves, which is yours in Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God, did not count equality with God something to be grasped but emptied himself by taking the form of a servant, being born in the likeness of men. And being found in human form, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross. (emphases added)

It was with this Scripture in mind that God showed me that even though I'm not a worship leader or evangelist with loud and up-front gifts, I was still of use in His kingdom. He let me see that even dancing in dhoke (something that apparently comes quite naturally to me) is a way to serve Him and others. But it was not just in my own walk that humility was evident. The people were ever ready to give and serve. Hospitality and generosity oozed off their homes and spirits. Every gesture, simple or grand, came from a place of utmost sincerity, and that was supremely special. Another word would be joy. How could I not include this word? Yes, there were hard times. I experienced trials and difficulties physically, emotionally, mentally, and spiritually. And yet, all I can recall when I think back is a soul-deep joy pervading my every memory. Every smile and tear from every person — both $\overline{\text{Oromo}}$ and American — filled my spirit with a lasting joy. And that's the difference between



happiness (which is what the world wants) and joy (which is what God gives): it lasts.

Finally, though, the last word is love, always love, because Love will always get

the last word. God is love, and He was more tangible on this trip than any of us in our physical bodies were. He came in power. He came in quiet. He came in song. He came in healing. He came in conversations. He came in prayer. He was inexorably present.

Reflecting back, there's no single answer to what impacted me on my recent trip to Ethiopia. There's no single story or theme that transcribes the amazing experience that was this short excursion into Africa. God made Himself new to me. I have "tasted and seen" that the LORD is good, but it tasted and looked different in Ethiopia. I heard new cadences in His voice. I felt new joys in His presence. But most importantly I saw that God was truly everywhere.

It's not that I didn't expect to find Him in Ethiopia—I most assuredly did. I was simply unprepared for the amount of Him that was there. I already have so much of God in my life, I couldn't have imagined there was so much more of Him to be had. I knew this conceptually, of course. I knew He was far more vast than anything I could conceive. But in Ethiopia, I felt this truth.

Everything about my time there showed me more about God. But, of course, it was the people that God used to reveal His simple beauty and living majesty. Even with cultural and language barriers, I came to adore Meron and Ammanuel. I miss them every day. I miss Meron's coffee and Ammanuel's laugh. I miss hearing them (and others) randomly yell, "Satawa!" It's amazing how in the Kingdom of God one can even feel loved when being called a giraffe.

Noah Bollinger: I went because I have been going through the past few years of my life not knowing what God's plan for my life was. I went because I had seen so many people return saying how the experience changed their lives. I was hoping that if I went God would show me his plan for my life. I learned that people in other parts of the world live drastically different lives than we do and they are satisfied. They may not be happy with their lot in life but they don't complain.

Hannah Gilliam: I went on this trip because my whole family was going and I felt like I should go too. I didn't think that the trip would change my life as much as it did. I am so thankful I chose to go because God showed me so many things. One good thing that God taught me through this trip was that love and trusting God are the most important things in life. If you do those to things, you will find the key to happiness. There was never a time that I didn't feel loved when I was with people in Ethiopia. They poured love out without even thinking about it.





Karen Pierce: I went on the trip to Ethiopia because I felt that God was calling me to go. It was very obvious that Ethiopia is in a different season—everyone that we met there was eager to here about God. It was "harvesting season." It was beautiful to see God coming after a people like that, beautiful to see Him pursuing people all over the world. It was also beautiful the way that our team was able to work together. I got to see all of our gifts working together as a body.

Jared Snyder: I mostly went on this trip for two reasons: 1) my wife, Anna, really wanted to go overseas and so I wanted to be part of that and 2) I wanted to learn more about a mission that one of my elders holds so dear to his heart. This trip taught me that one can never share enough love.



Alex Roberts: I went to Ethiopia because God has been calling me to missions since I was 16. When I first came to Priest Lake Christian Fellowship a few years later, Hand of Hope was getting a team together to go. My inner missionary begged and pleaded, but it wasn't God's timing. When the next trip began to be planned, though, I cried out to God, "Here am I! Send me!" And He did.

The most profound lesson I learned while in Ethiopia was that God uses ME, not just my gifts. As Christians, it can be so easy to get caught up with what we are "supposed" to be doing. But God isn't really concerned with that. He looks at our hearts. He sees who we truly are. He saw my heart in Ethiopia and used it to His glory. My spiritual gifts were rarely at use on this trip. Instead He most often let me bless through silliness, laughter, and service—foundational aspects of my personality. And I realized that that is who I am in Christ. My gifts are only a part of who I am in the kingdom of God, not everything.



Chris Boeing: I went on this trip to keep my part of my obedience to God's calling. I had felt for a number of years that if my children ever wished to go to Ethiopia with our PLCF team, that I would go also. It was simply one of those statements so impressed upon my heart that I never had to question or analyze it. When that day came and my oldest daughter approached me with a desire to go on the next trip, it was an easy call for me to make. God helped us exceed our financial goals for the trip, opened up my schedule from a demanding job, and surrounded us with loving and supportive team members. My loving wife made extraordinary efforts to make sure we had everything we would need, and she excelled in both raising and earning funds for the trip. The Lord taught me the importance of reliance on Him for everything. It had been a very long time since I had travelled to a location in which basic face-to-face communication could be a real challenge since English is not spoken by many folks. That would immediately invoke fear and feelings of vulnerability to which I would be very susceptible except God's Spirit quelled those negative emotions every time they popped into my head.

This past July, God connected the dots between Hand of Hope Ministries and True Love Children's Center in Hawassa, Ethiopia. True Love Children's Center is an orphanage founded by Mr. Messele Abebe and is currently home to nearly 40 children Messele's heart for the orphan grew out of his own experience as an orphan. Founded on James 1:27, True Love Children's Center not only cares for the orphan, but also works with impoverished women to teach them how to be self sustaining and care for their children. When members of the HOH Team paid a surprise visit to TLCC, they were greeted by warm and loving care-givers and the faces of happy children. The grounds were clean and it was obvious that the children were well loved and cared for Each member of the HOH team was greatly impacted by TLCC and left with the sense that God was doing a mighty work within the small compound.

TLCC is facing many financial challenges. Due to recent changes in government regulations, much of their funding has basically come to an end and Messele is trying desperately to find individuals and/or organizations who are willing to partner with him to keep the doors of TLCC open.
