Lonely Eyes Left Behind by HIV/Aids

Little did I know that a brief encounter of maybe five minutes would leave a lasting impression on my mind. The little boy was no more than 6 years old and had one of the sweetest faces I have ever seen in my life...but it wasn't the face that caught my attention, it was the eyes. His dark brown eyes said it all....he was lonely, sad and unsure of the future.

Liben is an orphan living with his grandmother in southern Ethiopia. He tragically lost his mother and then his father to HIV/Aids. He is one of an ever growing population of children orphaned in Ethiopia as a result of HIV/Aids.

According to an April 2005 report by the Kaiser Daily HIV/AIDS Report, there could be as many as 1.8 million Aids related deaths in Ethiopia by 2008. It is estimated that one-third of all adult deaths in Ethiopia is due to HIV/Aids. There is believed to be at least 2 million HIV-positive people living in Ethiopia today.

With these statistics, the harsh

reality of life for many Ethiopians hits hard, especially those in rural areas with little knowledge or education of how to prevent this deadly disease.

My brief encounter with Liben made a significant impact on my life. My heart broke not only for him, but also for the thousands of other children left orphaned by this terrible disease. I found myself looking into the eyes of the many children I passed on the street and in the market place wondering how many of them had lost a mother, father or possibly both to Aids.

The ministry of Gospel For All is not only about meeting the spiritual needs of people, but we also strive to meet their physical needs as well. That is why we are reaching out and providing our evangelists with some much needed education in the area of basic HIV/Aids prevention. Our evangelists minister among the Borana people. The Borana are a semi-nomadic people spread

throughout southern Ethiopia and northern Kenya. Due to traditional cultural practices it is acceptable to have multiple partners. As you can imagine, with this type lifestyle HIV/Aids can spread very rapidly. Many of the Borana are uneducated and have no idea that there is a way to prevent the spread of this deadly disease. Through our evangelists, Gospel For All's desire is to give hope to the

Liben planted the seed in my heart and made me realize the importance of playing a part in preventing the spread of HIV/ Aids among the Borana. He will always have a part of my heart and the look in his eyes will forever be in my mind. If Gospel For All can help prevent even one child from being orphaned by HIV/Aids, then Liben's loss will not have been in vain. Liben does not know the impact he made on my life, maybe one day he will.

HIV/Aids — What Part Can We Play?

HIV/Aids poses a tremendous threat to over a million people in Ethiopia today. The threat is even greater in rural areas where there is relatively little information about HIV/Aids and how it is transmitted. It is critical to educate those living in these rural areas of the dangers of HIV/Aids

The majority of evangelists supported by Gospel For All are situated in rural areas and therefore are in the unique position to make a significant impact on the lives of these people. Our goal is for the

evangelists to teach people about HIV/Aids as they share the Gospel of Jesus Christ with them. With proper training and resources, our evangelists can effectively provide valuable education about HIV/Aids.

One of the biggest challenges faced in the struggle against preventing the spread of HIV/ Aids is the stigma associated with it. Providing our evangelists with the proper Biblical teaching on loving and caring for

One of church that I visited was in southern Ethiopia. It is in a very small town where my father-in-law and mother-in law live. It was a good experience to see that church. Taadi is serving in the village of Harbale. This village is far from Mega -- he said it takes ten to twelve hours to get there by foot. It is hard to tell how many miles, I would guess it's anywhere from twenty to thirty miles. Can you imagine how hard it is to walk all day to get there?

These evangelists face a lot of hardships, but they committed to serve God. It is wonderful to see what God is doing through His people. This was a wonderful opportunity for me along with my entire family to see what God is doing. I praise God for all He is doing and what He has done!

Last issue we introduced you to Evangelist Tsega-ab Bekele who God allowed to cross our path in July of 2004 in Ethiopia. We continue to be excited and encouraged as we receive regular updates from Tsega-ab regarding the ministry that God has opened up before him. Tsega-ab has a gift for evangelism and training. His heart for evangelism has led him to start a 'traveling' school of ministry. He travels to different areas and conducts training seminars for pastors and evangelists in the area. These are intense classes that require a lot of commitment from participants. The training takes place one week out of every month over a three year period.

This past June, the ministry school in Yavello opened. Participants came from various surrounding areas. More than fifty students have joined the program. God is working through this ministry. Pastors from various churches

who were fighting, backbiting and having no communication with each other were brought together through Tsega-ab's ministry school. Today, these pastors are together in one class with a common goal of gaining further insight into God's Word. The fighting and backbiting have been replaced by a true love and respect for each other. For the first time they are inviting each other to share their church pulpit and together are planning for an area wide outreach. God is using this ministry to break down walls!

Pastor Eshetu is enrolled in the Yavello ministry school that opened the summer of 2005. Following, he shares a little bit of how this ministry has affected his life: "I had prayed for more than ten years that God would make a way for me to receive Biblical training in order to know Christ more and be more effective in my ministry. I did not expect the answer to come to me here in the area I am working. I am enjoying the student centered classes, practical heart to heart teaching, openness of the teacher and the presence of the Holy Spirit. I am so grateful and words can not express how this ministry school is impacting my life. God has used the two classes I have taken so far to totally revolutionize my life as well as the people in my church. The ministry school brings people from different denominations together in the true spirit of love and unity. Only God can make this possible in the midst of the wilderness in which we are living. God is using Brother Tsega-ab to positively influence my life and ministry. I am old enough for him to be my son. I know of his humble upbringing in this remote area, but today because of God's hand on his life, I am able to be one of his students. I praise God for Tsega-ab's life and ministry."

God is using Tsega-ab's ministry to touch many lives. God is using his simple approach to allow students enrolled in his ministry schools to experience a transformation and personal encounter with the living God through His word and the Holy Spirit.

Please pray for Tsega-abe as he continues to conduct these classes and opens new schools of ministry as funds are made available.

Dida Barako


Dida Barako was born in Teltelle in 1975. He attended school up through the sixth grade, but then dropped out due to pressure from his family who saw no value in education.

Dida received Christ as his personal Savior in 1991, but he fell back into a secular lifestyle. During this time, Dida got caught up in a lifestyle that included smoking, drinking alcohol and chewing *chat* (a common drug in East Africa). He was not on good terms with people and he worshiped many gods.

God used the Great Commission Ministry of Campus Crusade International to bring Dida back to Christ. He repented and has been a changed man since.

After coming back to Christ, Dida recognized his need for a Christian brother to help him grow and strengthen his relationship with Christ. Shortly thereafter, Evangelist Taadi, who serves with the Borana Outreach Ministry, started a work in the Gandelle area where Dida was living. It was through Taadi's ministry that Dida received the encouragement and accountability that he had been praying for.

Dida's desire is to serve the Lord who set him free from the sin that held him so tightly in bondage. He completed a two month Bible training program in Mega before being employed by the Borana Outreach Ministry to serve as an evangelist.



Boba Guyo

Boba Guyo was born in Teltelle in 1967. His father was killed by a neighbor when Boba was a child. When Boba became an adult and would tell others the story of how his father was killed, he always shared his determination to find revenge on the man who was responsible for his father's death. He was consumed by the spirit of revenge.

Boba accepted Christ in 1997 through a ministry of the Mekane Yesus Church. Accepting Christ transformed Boba's entire life. He no longer seeks revenge against the man who killed his father and considers him a friend. It is amazing what the power of the Holy Spirit can do in one's life!

Boba does not have any formal education, but he is able to read both Amharic (the national language of Ethiopia) and Oromo (his tribal language). Once he decided to go into evangelistic work, he went to the city of Mega and completed a two month Bible training program. After he completed this training, he was employed by the Borana Outreach Ministry to serve as an evangelist.

Boba is single and looking forward to what God has in store for him as he carries out the call God placed on his life to serve in evangelism.

Both Boba Guyo and Dida Barako are working in Gandelle. They took over the ministry that Taadi started in this area.

Boba and Dida have been working in Gandelle for about three months. They spend their time evangelizing as well as encouraging members of a church that was recently established in this area.

Four souls have come to Christ so far through Boba and Dida's ministry. Please pray that God would continue to bless their ministry and that many more souls would be added to the Kingdom. Pray that God would encourage these two young evangelists as they are still new in the ministry.

Evangelist Teshome continues to minister in Mega and the surrounding areas. Recently, Teshome has seen the mighty hand of God in his ministry. The majority of people living in the villages where he ministers are possessed with evil spirits. Through Teshome's teaching of the gospel and through prayer, the evil spirit's stronghold is disintegrating. Teshome asks for all Christians to join him in prayer as he continues to work in these villages.

Pray for Teshome's protection spiritually, mentally and physically as he presses on in this area.

Work in this area is difficult, but one by one people are coming to Christ. Over the past six months one individual came to Christ and many others promised to think about salvation. Pray that God would continue to work in their hearts and bring them to repentance and a relationship with Christ.

Evangelism & HIV/Aids: Workshop For Evangelists

The threat posed by HIV/Aids to the well being of the Borana people is immense, particularly in rural areas where there is relatively no information about HIV/Aids. Many of the people in these areas have no idea how this terrible disease is spread or any hope of preventing the spread. They must be educated with the basics and reminded of the danger of HIV/Aids.

Most all of the evangelists supported by Gospel For All are situated in these rural areas and their efforts can have a significant impact. In order for them to effectively minister and make a significant contribution in dealing with HIV/Aids, they must be equipped with the knowledge as to how best to communicate to these people about HIV/Aids. Providing this type of basic training to the evangelists will boost their

capacity in communicating information to those they are ministering to.

With all of this in mind, Gospel For All in conjunction with the Borana Outreach Ministry plans to provide a one week workshop to bring all of the evangelists together to receive training from qualified professionals who are currently involved with HIV/Aids in Ethiopia.

The training will focus on basic HIV/Aids prevention methods along with Biblical teaching on loving and caring for the sick. It is important for our evangelists to fully understand the Biblical teaching on loving and care for the sick in order for them to personally be able to genuinely love and care for those living with HIV/Aids. With this attitude, they will be able to help shape the society's outlook on HIV/Aids.

A major benefit of this week long workshop will be the opportunity it provides to bring the evangelists together to be able to get to know each other, share experiences and encourage each other. In addition, it will allow for the leadership committee to give a detailed account to the evangelists of how the ministry is being run and the objectives of the ministry.

The first week-long workshop is scheduled to be held October 10 ~ 15, 2005 in Awassa, which is where the leadership team of the Borana Outreach Ministry resides.

After this initial workshop, we will evaluate the success of this workshop and consider whether it will be beneficial to make this an annual event.
